Bluhm Cardiovascular Institute Celebrates 20 Years of Saving Lives

Over the past two decades, Northwestern Medicine Bluhm

Cardiovascular Institute has become a global destination for life-saving therapies, breakthrough procedures and research that has transformed cardiovascular care. Founded on Valentine's Day in 2005, the institute was created with a generous gift from local philanthropist Neil G. Bluhm to help Northwestern Medicine meet the growing need for world-class cardiovascular care in Chicago and beyond.

"I felt it would be important to the city that we have a great heart hospital instead of a situation where the wealthy were traveling elsewhere and everybody else was not getting great treatment," says Bluhm.

Anchored in downtown Chicago, Bluhm Cardiovascular Institute has expanded across Northwestern Medicine and is now integrated into nine Northwestern Medicine hospitals. This makes it possible for patients to receive most cardiovascular care in locations close to home, only traveling downtown for highly complex procedures.

Cardiovascular diseases remain the leading cause of death, but breakthrough discoveries and new technologies are dramatically lowering that burden.
