NM Hospitals Achieve Recognition

Seven NM hospitals received national, regional or state recognition in the *U.S. News & World Report* America's "Best Hospitals" rankings.

Northwestern Memorial Hospital has again earned Honor Roll status, being ranked No. 10 in the nation and No. 1 in the Chicago Metro Region and Illinois. This is the 10th consecutive year that NMH has been ranked as the top hospital in Illinois.

Northwestern Medicine Central DuPage Hospital ranked No. 10 in the Chicago Metro Region and No. 10 in Illinois. **Northwestern Medicine Delnor Hospital** ranked No. 17 in the Chicago Metro Region and No. 19 in Illinois. **Northwestern Medicine Lake Forest Hospital** ranked No. 13 in the Chicago Metro Region and No. 15 in Illinois.

Northwestern Medicine McHenry Hospital, Northwestern Medicine Huntley Hospital and Northwestern Medicine Woodstock Hospital ranked together at No. 14 in the Chicago Metro Region and No. 16 in Illinois. The hospitals jumped seven spots from their 2020 ranking of No. 23 in Illinois and five spots from their 2020 ranking of No. 19 in the Chicago Metro Region.

Support for Mental Health in Black Communities

NM Extends the Reach of Trauma Helpline for Longtime Partner

Northwestern Medicine is committed to addressing the underlying causes of violence that persistently plague Chicago. Exposure to violence and subsequent trauma contribute to long-lasting physical and mental health issues.

In early 2020, as violence continued to increase in Bronzeville, the pandemic took a heavy toll. By April 2020, Black residents accounted for almost 70% of the deaths from COVID-19 in Chicago, although they only make up 30% of the population. The stay-at-home order and its economic impact significantly harmed the Bronzeville community.

It was the need to serve those impacted that led to the founding of Bright Star Community Outreach (BSCO), a community-based organization in Chicago's Bronzeville neighborhood. BSCO is led by founder and CEO Pastor Chris Harris Sr., also the founder and senior pastor of Bright Star Church in Chicago. Harris grew up in Bronzeville and recognized the need for an organization like BSCO. The organization offers a variety of programs, including mental and behavioral health services through The Urban Resilience Network, which is funded in part by Northwestern Medicine.

Volunteers by the Numbers

1,003 volunteers currently donate their time in service to their community through Northwestern Medicine.

343 mask ambassador volunteers donated **15,172** hours of service to support COVID-19 safety protocols in NM facilities since October 2020.

96 vaccination clinic volunteers donated **2,300** hours of service to assist NM patients in early 2021.

283 student volunteers, many with an interest in pursuing healthcare professions, devoted time this summer to supporting NM patients, visitors and employees.
